The Annual Conference included some of the "norm," related to the business of the Conference. Items included the annual budget, nominations, compensation standards, and care for our retired clergy members. A number of other items were considered, including a response to the violence in Orlando, a resolution in support of the Council of Bishop's report ("A Way Forward" from General Conference), and a call for non-conformity with the Book of Discipline on matters related to human sexuality. The Annual Conference concluded on the evening of June 18th with the Commissioning and Ordination Service. Bishop Minerva G. Carcaño preached, and a number of persons were Commissioned and Ordained, including the ordination of Pastor Bob from PB UMC as well as Pastor Darin Arntson from San Dieguito UMC. We celebrate the good work completed by all the delegates and clergy members of the California-Pacific Annual Conference! Reports from our delegates will be available in the Church Office soon. Dear Friends...

remember going to church as a child, and I'm sure that the primary reason for my attendance was simply because my parents took me and I was too young to stay home alone. This changed a bit as I got older, and eventually it became my own choice to attend church.

The journey to get to this place is its own story, and the choice I eventually made to prioritize my faith was surely not the end of the journey. It is a story that – I hope – may be instructive for us all as we face the ongoing realities of the national decline in worship attendance and church membership.

Among my earliest church memories are those that are familiar to many of our children at PB UMC. I attended Sunday School each week and learned some of the more dramatic stories of our history and faith. We played and we learned, and from time to time we were invited to join together with the older and younger kids for a game showlike Bible Battle, showcasing our passion and knowledge of our sacred texts.

One quick note: to my knowledge, I never won....

I also sang in the children's choir, not only learning songs written about our rich faith but also learning a deep love of music as well as how to present music in a worship setting. I think it's possible that this early musical experience coupled with a home environment filled with piano and other instruments helped me to develop a profound love of music.

And there are a few things I think I missed out on. In none of the churches I attended as a child do I remember ever going forward during the worship service for time with the Pastor. There was no children's time. There was no opportunity to ask the burning question about what I'd heard in Sunday School. There was no chance to move beyond the necessarily limited Sunday School curriculum.

Another thing missing is that I don't remember ever being taught what it meant to "go to church." As a child, I didn't learn about the candles and communion, I wasn't taught about hymnals and homilies, and I had limited understanding of the organ and the offering.


To be sure, I learned a great deal about these things in my early teen years when I chose to take an acolyte class. But I wonder how much our children miss out on when we don't take this time. This is not a critique of the many, many people who helped me to become the Christian that I am. This is an intentional reflection of how we at PB UMC can build on what has helped to make us who we are so we can guide our own children into a deep and committed faith in a Creator God, a risen Christ, and a present Spirit.

It is for this reason that I take time during each worship service to speak with our children, to ask questions, and to hear their own thoughts and ideas. It is for this reason that I do choose to allow our creative children to ask their own questions and perhaps even to derail my own plans for that time. (Doesn't God derail our plans from time to time?) It is for this reason that I spent months teaching our children about the narthex and the chancel and the hymnal and the organ and the ushers and the chapel and the pews and so much more! And it is for this reason that I have not and will not seek silence from children during our worship services.

I continually assert that our children should not be seen as the church of the future but the church of today. Too many youth and young adults leave our churches because they don't have the opportunities to be themselves, to ask questions, to struggle, to doubt, and to be supported by a caring community. Too many youth and young adults experience rigidity and hypocrisy and are robbed of the critical thinking necessary for a lasting and fruitful faith.

Many of us remember those who have taught us about our faith, including the support and grace necessary for us to choose it for ourselves. I believe we must choose to create a space for our own children to do the same.

ur congregation received thank you letters for contributions totaling \$1217 toward the Imagine No Malaria campaign. By May, 2016, the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) was able to distribute 1.2 million insecticide-treated bed nets throughout Africa. More than 5,400 community health workers were trained to properly deliver the nets. It is estimated that today, malaria's impact has been cut in half.

New Entra Casa expressed gratitude for our May gift of \$487 to enable them to provide services to women and children in need in San Diego.

Guatemala Marketplace Visits PB UMC July 31

he Guatemala Mission Project is a program of Interfaith Action International, a religious, non-profit organization that is affiliated with the United Methodist Church. This organization has been working in the highlands of Guatemala serving primarily poor indigenous persons since 1992, taking volunteer construction teams and medical teams to the site. They build educational, medical, and recreational facilities, and provide scholarships and multiple home and environmental improvements.

The work is funded primarily through the sale of indigenous Mayan products. "Our shared work and prayers help support healthy, educated, and culturally stable Mayan communities." The Mission Project Sale of products from independent artists, family run businesses, and community cooperatives will be Sunday, July 31, before, between and after worship services. All proceeds from sales of these Mayan products, as well as donations, go directly to funding the mission program in Guatemala. Reflections from the Finance and Stewardship Team

everal members of the finance team are attending Financial Peace University on Sunday afternoons. We are using tools for household budgeting that are a reminder of how challenging it can be to adjust expectations to reality.

The big hits to May's expense budget were for replacing the parsonage door and for using and maintaining church property. Water, sewer, gas, and electricity bills are coming in significantly higher than budgeted. Some repair costs will be covered by income that we withdraw quarterly from our endowments, while expenses are budgeted 1/12 per month but occur with irregular timing. Overall, we have a less accurate budget this year, and are trying to adjust to the realities. Your creative suggestions and prayers are encouraged.



Meet Our Talented Musicians Liesl & Steve Spence

his month we are meeting Liesl and Steve S., two of our extremely talented musicians. They have been married for 7 years. They met while attending Michigan State, where they were both studying music and played in the marching band. They have three boys aged 5, 3, and 1 month old. They both teach music in local middle schools. Liesl teaches at La Jolla Day and Steve at Greenfield in El Cajon.

LiesI moved to San Diego about 9 years ago and looked for a church. "I was looking for a welcoming church and found PB UMC to be just that. I found there were lots of music teachers at PB UMC. How much more welcoming could it be?" Steve moved here later and shared LiesI's enthusiasm for PB UMC. They both became very involved. LiesI plays French horn solos and is our youth choir co-director. Steve occasionally accompanies our choir on the drums or piano and often operates the sound system.

Steve told me they have lots of instruments at home. They both started listing them: a drum set, a piano, trumpets, a sax-ophone, a flute, a French horn, a violin, a guitar, a trombone, a bass, a recorder, and a whistle. They listed the instruments so fast, I know I didn't get them all.



How did they get started in music? Steve's sister took piano lessons and she inspired him to do so also when he was in the first grade. "When I was in the 4th grade, I started playing the drums. While in school, I participated in the jazz band and youth orchestras. Music has been a major part of my life." LiesI starting playing the French horn in the 5th grade. "I was visiting my grandparents, and the daughter of a friend played the French horn, and I was able to get decent sounding notes on it, so I continued to learn to play it. I now play several brass instruments."

Liesl participates in a show a year at San Diego Musical Theater. "I also belong to the Hornswoggle, a fun group of 30 French horn players. Many are members of San Diego symphony, but we also have doctors, lawyers, etc."

Steve is about to begin work towards a master's degree. "As a public school teacher, I need to keep updating my knowledge, and the information provided is useful for teaching. Our goal in teaching middle school musicians is not to create professional musicians, but to provide the kids a love of music they can include as part of their lives."

We are very fortunate to have these two among our talented musicians. I certainly enjoyed talking with them. They actually inspired me to start playing the piano again.
