## Summer Camp is Around the Corner - **Dee**

It is already June! Pastor Bob and I have been talking about the importance of camp and as a congregation, you have been very generous towards helping send our children to camp. So, we thought you might like to know more about the program. This summer it's time to learn about "Living in the Spirit!" together. Through fun active time outside in God's creation and sharing in small groups and worship, campers and staff will feel inspired by the power of the Holy Spirit - learn from it, grow from it and find passion for changing the world as Jesus' followers.

The Cal-Pac Conference camps have the same summer camp theme. This creates unity and makes campers more comfortable if they need to attend a different site due to schedule conflicts. There are three southern CA sites with Elementary, Jr. High and Sr. High age levels camps this summer. Campers can start attending as young as first grade and go throughout high school. In addition to the age level camps, there are also specialty camps offered including Surf Camp, Backpacking Camp, Adventure Camp, Film Camp, and Creation Camp. A week of camp is about \$400.

PB UMC campers generally attend Camp Cedar Glen which is in Julian, CA. This summer we have campers signed up for all three weeks of age level camps. We also have folks from PB UMC serving as volunteer leaders and counselors at Elementary and Jr. High Camps, including Pastor Bob and myself! The camps run for 3 weeks back to back starting on Sunday, July 5 running through Saturday, July 25. Please pray for camp and our campers each of those days in July. If you would like to send a note to PB campers to let them know you are thinking of them, please speak to me.



Camp Cedar Glen has a variety of cabins, but they all have indoor plumbing, electricity and bunk beds. The Camp Leadership team assigns cabins and groups. Campers are under adult supervision at all times and have a schedule, but the schedule has lots of time for fun. A day in the life of a camper usually includes, but is not limited to: morning devotion, breakfast, cabin clean-up, worship, small "family" group discussion and activities, outdoor fun (hiking, climbing, archery, swimming, sports), crafts or science fun, social activities, quiet time, rest time, campfire, evening devotion, etc.

I started to list some of the reasons I think church camp is so important. But, the list got out of hand. Most of all, it is CHURCH camp. Campers live together in Christian community learning and sharing about their faith for 137 hours. (Yes, there may be some sleeping hours in there.) Each week of camp is unique which adds to the excitement, but the reason I love being a camp leader is camp does change lives. I have asked my Sunday School class at various times over the years, where or when is a time when they have felt God's presence. There is always at least one that will say at church camp.

# Pastor Bob's Printed Blog

Dear Friends:

As we look toward the summer months, we are closer to our children and youth being out of school. This is – of course – a time that many children and youth see for freedom, a break from schedules, and an opportunity for a bit more independence and self-discovery. What better place for this than camp?

To be honest, I mostly missed camp as a youth. I went one year when I was in Junior High, and there was no shortage of awkwardness as I tried to navigate this new experience in a new place. And the relationships begun in that awkward and amazing experience were a source of strength and compassion and love through one of the most difficult parts of my life.

Camping changes lives.

That's what it says at the top of the website for the California-Pacific Conference Camping program: camping changes lives. And I believe it does.

It was through participation in camping ministries that I understood that I was called to ordained ministry. A number of my colleagues have shared their own camping stories that have either shaped their ministries or have been their own understanding of call. Bishop Mary Ann Swenson (who was our own Bishop until she retired in 2012) came to understand her call to ministry at a Junior High camp in Mississippi.

But this is not the only way camp changes lives, and I am doubtful that we could quantify the profound impact camp has on children and youth. Camp offers a community in which our children and youth may experience their unique journeys of faith alongside others who have some of the same questions and same struggles and same joys. Camp offers a place free from distraction where God may be more fully experienced. Camp offers a sense of comfort and safety that is not immediate but is long-lasting. Camp offers a place to be vulnerable and to learn leadership and to struggle with scripture and to laugh and to be in intense community.

Camping changes lives.



I remember vividly the very first year I was a camp counselor. I was new and a bit intimidated. I didn't know many people and I was in a place where I had never been. One of the things that intrigued me was the counselor who brought his guitar. And it was there that I decided that I wanted to play guitar, too.

I remember vividly a young man in a small group who shared that camp was the only place where he didn't feel crushed and stepped on. Instead, he felt healed and loved.

I remember vividly a young woman in tears because a loved one was experiencing medical difficulties and she feared losing this loved one to death. She wanted someone to pray with her, and she experienced comfort and love.

I remember vividly the brilliant smile on a young face during a first-ever volleyball serve as he was cheered on by peers and leaders, regardless of where the ball landed.

I remember vividly two young men receiving the news of the death of a loved one – the second in a terribly short period of time – and the way they were surrounded in love.

I remember vividly the sounds of singing around a campfire as hands were clasped, as Holy Communion was received, as hearts were filled with emotion, and the love of God was present.

Camping changes lives.

Pacific Beach UMC has a wonderful tradition of participating in camping and supporting our young people as they join with such a profoundly powerful community. What a joy it is to know that the participation and support from this community of faith has such an impact. It is indeed a privilege to serve alongside you.

## Sunday School News

A lot of us know about the physical, social, emotional, etc. stages children go through as they grow up, but how does this pertain to their faith development? David Elkind, Ph.D., professor of child study at Tufts University, has identified three stages of faith development:

- **The "global" stage.** Until age six or seven, Elkind says, most children lack an understanding of abstract belief, and therefore can't conceptualize the differences between religious faiths. They can appreciate religious symbols and rituals, but won't necessarily connect them to the notion of an "invisible" God.
- **The "concrete" stage.** Children ages 7 to 12 are still very grounded in the concrete, and are beginning to develop a greater sense of spiritual identity based on personal experience and religious practice (I go to church or I go to synagogue and this is connected to who I am and who my family is). Elkind says that rituals, whether lighting candles in church or opening the ark holding a Torah in a synagogue, are very effective in helping children this age understand religious themes.
- **The "personal connection" stage.** In pre-adolescence, a feeling of personal closeness to God often emerges, the budding of what feels like an actual relationship. For some young teens, Elkind says, "God becomes a confidante, because you don't want to share your thoughts with anyone else who will tell your secrets."

Children's thoughts and feelings about God or other spiritual themes appear to be a natural part of human development, a search for some force in the universe that represents eternity and the absence of change. Even children who are not raised in a religious home are likely to ask spiritual questions. - Travel-sized hand sanitizer, wipes, soap, shampoo

- Walk the streets of Pacific Beach, delivering helper bags and inviting people in need to our Wednesday night meals, medical and dental clinic, etc.
- Carry helper bags in your car and hand them out to those asking for assistance on the side of the road and at intersections.

## Reflections from the Finance and Stewardship Team

Your accounting team has been working behind the scenes to implement an online version of our QuickBooks accounting system. This upgrade came up unexpectedly and was necessary to continue meeting payroll. Many sincerethanks to Aimee Kay, Mark Berry, and Scott Caprio for their hard work on this transition.

Because of this change, we are getting used to a new set of reports. That's why the Financial Status table is labeled "preliminary."

Please note that the negative year-to-date income will be offset by revenue we are eligible to draw from our endowments to cover expenses we've already paid. Taking that revenue into account, we are just about breaking even.

## Work around the Church

A couple of our tables used for our Wednesday Night Guests and church potlucks needed a bit of tightening up by Art.

What's in a plug? Some of them can be shocking! After a complaint about a shock received while using one of our electrical plugs, PB UMC had a registered electrician in to replace loose, damaged, or un-grounded plugs in the Social Hall and Education/Office wing. Further work will be performed soon, to allow the office spaces to have AC during the hot months, and to help keep the dental clinic's circuits from being overloaded.



In Arizona border towns, communities facing social challenges are dramatically divided. In Liberian villages, citizens' human rights are being violated. In local U.S. communities, women and girls are being bought and sold against their will. Moved by Christ's love to pursue reconciliation and peace, honoring the dignity of every individual made in God's image, The United Methodist Church is unwilling to turn a blind eye to injustice.

Although we may lack the resources alone to effect change in a broken world, your giving is vital for the UMC to continue its global ministries of reconciliation. Because of the Peace with Justice Sunday offering, the people of The United Methodist Church are able to make a difference together by sowing seeds—and yielding fruit!—of peace.

When we give on Peace with Justice Sunday, our gifts make possible our critical kingdom work in the world. Because we give:

- Methodists spearhead a peace ministry uniting Arizona border communities
- United Methodists in Liberia are being equipped to implement the denomination's Social Principles to address social-justice issue
- Pennsylvania students are educating their community about sex-trafficking at home and abroad

In Jesus' inaugural address, standing in his home synagogue in Nazareth, he detailed his game plan, "The Spirit of the Lord is on me, because he has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim freedom for the prisoners and recovery of sight for the blind, to set the oppressed free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor." (Luke 4:18-19) Through our giving good news is proclaimed to—and experienced by—the poor. Thanks be to God!
