Interfaith Shelter Network and PB UMC

This is the 30th season that PB UMC has hosted guests from the Interfaith Shelter Network, the shelter program where more than 200 homeless men, woman and children receive shelter and other services throughout the San Diego region for a two-week period. Over the years, the demographical composition of shelter guest has changed; we are seeing more single mothers with children. Our guests will arrive Saturday, February 20th to officially launch the start of the twoweek period here at PB UMC. Each guest in the Interfaith Shelter Network is pre-screened and receives additional case management support in their endeavor to get their lives on more solid footing. The guests will be at the church from 5 pm in the evening to 8 am the next morning each day during their two-week stay. They will sleep at the church, shower at the church, eat their breakfasts and dinners at the church. As each guest leaves during the day, for work, job hunting, going to school or Sunday worship services, we will send them off with a healthy sack lunch.

Since the 1980's homelessness has been recognized as a social problem in the United States; and for over 30 years the PB UMC ministries in collaboration with the Interfaith Shelter Network and other organizations has helped provide some immediate survival demands for adequate food and health service needs. The continuance of this service tradition at PB UMC is achieved with the contributions of our members and friends who generously donate their talents, gifts and services. As we move into the 30th season, the volunteer recruitment will start early January. Sign-up sheets will be located in the church lobby after each worship service. There are a variety of volunteer opportunities, but the most critical needs are overnight supervisors, dinner hosts, bagged lunch donors, set-up volunteers on February 20th (including luggage and cots pick-up) and clean-up on March 5th (shelter break-down, washing bed linens). Send an email at the address below, if you want to get an early start filling-in volunteer slots.

During the month of January, donation boxes will be available in the narthex to collect personal care items for our guests, such as deodorant, hand and body lotion (travel size), gloves, socks, soap, toothpaste and brushes, feminine hygiene items, razors, shampoo and conditioners. Coordinators Ken, Betty, and Steve thank you for your support and service. Together we are looking forward to hosting and displaying our genuine PB UMC hospitality in welcoming guests. There will be a volunteer orientation lunch after the 2nd worship service early February, for season veterans and new volunteers. It is very important that those who volunteer to serve or prepare food attend this orientation. The County Department of Health requires food handling and safety training. Pastor Bob's Printed Blog

Dear Friends:

In early December – just last month – I breathed a sigh of relief as I submitted more than ninety pages of written material for the Ordination process in our California-Pacific Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church. As many of you have offered generosity of prayer and spirit, you have also asked what is entailed in such a process and where your Pastor's status currently stands. As I have been in conversation with some, the question is not only important in relation to the servant leadership of this congregation but also of great importance to several in our midst who are considering their own call or Ordained Ministry. While there are some options depending on a person's call to ministry, I will outline the current process for ordination as an Elder in Full Connection in The United Methodist Church.

The first step is Candidacy, and it begins with a conversation with your Pastor. Conversation will be centered around the idea of *call* and experiencing a divine call to ministry. The UMC publishes a book called *The Christian as Minister*, and this will be recommended and discussed as well. Then someone seeking Candidacy will write a letter or speak with the District Superintendent, meet with the local church's Staff-Parish Relations Committee (SPRC), and be affirmed by the annual Charge Conference.

Then there are educational requirements. Candidates for Elder must have a Master of Divinity degree from an approved seminary, usually an eighty-to-ninety unit degree. Candidates must meet regularly with both their local SPRC as well as a District Committee on Ordained Ministry for evaluation and support, and eventually will be recommended to the Annual Conference's Board of Ordained Ministry.

At this stage a Candidate who passes the Board of Ordained Ministry would be *commissioned* as a Provisional Elder. With this in mind, not all Candidates pass on their first evaluation with the Board and some are returned to the care of the District Committee. At this point in my own process, I am a Provisional Elder; and the papers I recently submitted are for the next step in the process.

Once a Provisional Elder has completed mentoring and continuing education requirements and has been under Appointment for at least two years, she or he may apply

for Full Connection. This process is very similar to the process for Provisional status, and includes a detailed written evaluation that *could* lead to an in-person interview with the Board of Ordained Ministry. Both must be passed in order to be recommended for Ordination.

There are many details that are not specified here, and I encourage any who might be interested in knowing more to contact me. For many, this is a process that seems difficult -(not an unfair assessment) and I strongly suggest that alongside this difficulty comes a great deal of grace and care. It is a process that can bring tears of joy and tears of grief, moments of heartbreak and moments of elation; and surely God is present to guide those who feel called to ordained ministry.

In my experience, one of the most positive elements of this process is the emphasis on learning. Candidates and provisional members are not only required to meet various degreed or continuing education requirements, but the interaction with mentors and others in process aids us in learning about ourselves and our experiences of the divine. Very often I speak of the importance of intellectual study in our faith, and I do so because of these profound experiences.

And so I would like to invite you into a learning experience. If you have felt as though you wish to move deeper into your faith and your relationship with God, I invite you to consider a way to engage in some form of learning, some form of study. I often try to include elements of learning in our weekly sermons, and I think we can go beyond even this. A number of PB UMC members are planning to start new small group studies, and this is surely an option. We have a faithful group of members who meet on Saturday mornings for Bible study, and another group that meets during our 9:30am worship service on the Lanai.

Shoreline, Casting a Net of Care by Beth

Even though we've just begun, there are many exciting things happening for Shoreline Community Services..

Through a wonderful new member of PB UMC, Shoreline has been able to develop a partner-ship with St. James Episcopal Church's Health Services Committee. This committee manages a fund dedicated to helping those who cannot afford the medical care they need. This committee has approved funding to assist with surgeries, outpatient procedures, and special eye-wear and wheelchair replacement for children with disabilities. We are excited to partner with the clinic to help more of our guests get needed healthcare.

Our clinic leaders voiced a need for a Spanish speaking volunteer to help with our guests. Reaching out to a former colleague, we now have an excellent Spanish speaking volunteer to assist starting after the first of the year. She currently works as a rapid rehousing case manager for Father Joe's Villages and brings a vast knowledge of helpful services. If you know of someone who fluently speaks Spanish who could assist one week out of the month we would love to hear from them so this doesn't become a burden to any one volunteer.

Wednesday, December 16, 2015, Feeding America worked in partnership with Health and Human Services providing the opportunity for our guests to sign up for Cal-Fresh (more commonly known as food stamps). This was the pilot of a new program of this partnership to go out into the community in an effort to reach more of those in need. With a goal of helping 8 guests complete their process for receiving Cal-Fresh, they were able to meet that goal and assist 4 more complete expedited applications. The professionals from Feeding America and HHSA, who used the lanai for the evening, admired the facility, stating it is beautiful and comfortable. They also shared that this was a very successful beginning and they look forward to returning in March.

I feel so blessed to be a part of this exciting venture. God has blessed this new beginning with opportunities we had never imagined. We pray for the discernment necessary to stay focused on our mission and uplift those in need with opportunities for greater self-sufficiency with dignity. Thank you all for your prayers, words of love and encouragement and generous support. This endeavor would not be possible without you.


All Church Family Camp Retreat

We All Count!

The Regional Task Force on the Homeless (RTFH) has a vision to help put an end to homelessness in the San Diego region by providing comprehensive data and analysis that will empower the community to identify, implement, and support efforts to prevent and alleviate homelessness. The reports and analysis collected by the RTFH results in critical funding for services, ongoing support, and coordination between agencies and programs.

The WeALLCount campaign allows our region to qualify for millions in critical funds that go directly to services which address homelessness on many levels, including targeted services that lead to homeless persons becoming permanently housed. TRFH began in 1984 as the San Diego Mayor's task Force on Homelessness and became an independent 501©c nonprofit in 2004.

TRFH is seeking volunteers for its yearly WeALLCount outreach. They need both Count Volunteers to count unsheltered homeless persons on January 29 (4-7am) and Interview Volunteers to conduct interviews with homeless individuals from January 29 to February 5. All volunteers will be placed in teams of 2-3 persons. PB UMC will be the host for the beach communities region.
