Interfaith Shelter Network and PB UMC 2017

his is our 31st season of hosting Interfaith Shelter Network guests at Pacific Beach UMC. The collaborative program serves more than 200 homeless men, women, and children in San Diego who receive shelter and other services for a two week period. Over the years, the demographical composition of shelter guests has changed; we are seeing more single mothers with children.

Our guests will arrive Saturday, January 28th, to officially launch the start of the two week period here at PB UMC. Each guest in the Interfaith Shelter Network is pre-screened and receives additional case management support as they endeavor to get their lives on more solid footing. The guests will be at the church from 5:00 pm in the evening to 7:00 am the following morning each day during their two-week stay. They will sleep at the church, shower at the church, and eat their breakfasts and dinners at the church. As each guest leaves during the day for work, job hunting, or going to school or Sunday worship services, we send them off with a healthy sack lunch.

Continuance of the Interfaith Shelter Network tradition at PB UMC is achieved through the contributions of members and friends who generously donate their talents, gifts, and services. The volunteer recruitment has begun; sign-up sheets are located in the church lobby after each worship service. There are a variety of volunteer opportunities, but the most critical needs are overnight supervisors, dinner hosts, lunch hosts, set-up volunteers January 28th (including luggage and cots pick-up) and clean-up February 11th (shelter break-down, washing bed linens).

During the month of January, donation boxes will be placed in the narthex to collect personal care items such as deodorant, hand and body lotion (travel size), gloves, socks, soap, toothpaste and brushes, feminine hygiene items, razors, shampoo, and conditioners for our guests.

Along with my fellow coordinators, Betty J. and Steve F., we thank you for your support and service. Together, we are looking forward to hosting and displaying our genuine PB UMC hospitality in welcoming guests. For questions and inquires please contact Ken B. at KenB@pbumc.org. Pastor Bob's Printed Blog

Dear friends...

s a parent, I have the wonderful opportunity to learn from my children. I confess that I do not always take advantage of this opportunity, and that when I do indeed open my eyes to the many things they have to offer I am often filled with awe.

Very often, I see both of the boys enjoying wonderful success at the things they want to do. Whether it is the latest video game or their academics or community sports, I am overjoyed at what these two small-ish humans are able to accomplish.

Something that they have taught me is that when any of us enjoy success on a regular basis, we often fall into the illusion that *everything* will be easy for us. A similar expression is that when a particular facet of our lives is easy, it will *always* be easy. Of course, we can see the fallacy of these statements. We cannot expect that everything will be easy, nor can we expect that what is easy today will be easy tomorrow or next week or next year. We simply cannot expect this. It is unreasonable.

So why is it that we expect our faith to be easy?

There are some in our congregation – like me – who grew up in communities of faith. We were taken to church or maybe went to religious schools. We became comfortable early on with the traditions and the special names for things and with the acronyms. We know the basic flow and when to stand and when to sit and when to reach for a hymnal.

With all this experience, we can sometimes forget that it's new for many who come through the doors of the church. And to walk into a new faith community and have to decipher what may seem like a foreign language surely can't be easy. To be honest, was it easy for us at first?

Others in our congregation may have come to faith through a particularly traumatic or hurtful time in their life. These journeys are all unique with their own sets of circumstances and challenges and pains. And in conversations with some who have come to faith in this way, I have sensed the notion that because one person made it through then everyone else should as well. But if it wasn't easy for one person, should we expect it to be easy for others?

The idea I'm trying to lead to is simply this: faith isn't easy. We might creatively discern some simple ways of expressing our ideas of faith, but actually doing faith isn't easy. In fact, I think it can be profoundly difficult.

Beginning January 8, 2017, we will embark on a new sermon series called "How to be a Christian in Seven Easy Steps." The series is guided loosely by the book What's the Least I can Believe and Still Be a Christian? by Marin Thielen. During this 7-week series, we'll explore some of the things that we don't need to believe as Christians (that we can't doubt or have questions; that we can be judgmental and obnoxious) as well as some of the more critical and necessary parts of our faith (like Jesus's life and teachings and death and resurrection).

I believe this series might be an easy entry for people with misperceptions or questions about faith and Christianity, and I humbly suggest it may be an excellent opportunity to invite others to join the people of Pacific Beach UMC on a journey to discover our faith more deeply. Please consider inviting family, friends, neighbors, or coworkers to visit during this series.

As we all approach this new year, I hope we do so with open eyes to the things we can unlearn and the things we can learn.

Our Beloved Evergreen Tree

ur large evergreen tree was originally planted in the northwest corner of the courtyard. It was moved to its current location for more room to grow and to become a central symbol. For many years coffee was served on the east side of

the tree, using actual cups and saucers. Candle light services were held around it on Christmas Eves with a nativity scene as the focal point.

Sometime in the 1990s, Andy from the top of the administrative decorated the tree with strings of season. Years later, white incanused. For many years we rented Hardware Rental until they went

H-S. strung a power cord building to the tree, and big bulbs for the holiday descent bulb nets were a tall ladder from Ace out of business. We then

purchased a 40 foot (heavy) fiberglass ladder which is stored on the north side of the admin building.

A cherry picker has been considered, and would be quite useful for the top third of the nets. The big ladder is difficult to maneuver. It has been used a lot this past

year when a number of the nets, or fuses therein, had to be replaced.

Ron and Louis initiated a switch to LED multicolor nets. We have used a number of different stars at the top of the tree. The star is on a pole which is inserted in a PVC pipe tied to the top of the tree (and left there). The tree has become a Pacific Beach Christmas symbol and attracts a number of sight seers. We have enjoyed many Christmas Eve candle light services around the tree.

Many people have participated in putting up the lights and taking them down. Dick V. S. has been the chief honcho for years, but now says it is time for someone else (much younger) to become the coordinator. Kevin McG. was a chief assistant. Most recently, Art M. has been a key player, following in Tracy Starr's footprints.


"We All Count" (Annual Homeless Count)

Where are they? What led to their homelessness? What do they need in order to move forward with their lives?

In the early morning hours of January 27, 2017, hundreds of volunteers will participate in the WeAllCount. Census in 27 locations throughout San Diego. This event, led by the Regional Task Force on the Homeless, enables our entire region to better understand the scope, impact, and potential solutions to homelessness. It also empowers our community to qualify for funding that is critical to keeping homeless shelters open throughout San Diego County.

Reflections from the Finance Team

In November we recorded extra income of \$11,948.71 from the Sabatka legacy to offset final rental renovation expenses. This puts us back in an accurate view of our year to date losses, though it exaggerates November income. Expenses for rental renovation are covered for now by a special draw from the Sabatka legacy, with some level of insurance reimbursement still expected. As a reminder, our other expenses have held to a bit below budget--but unfortunately we budgeted for an increase in income that did not materialize.

For 2017 we are tasked with curbing that excessive optimism to set a budget that lives within our means. At press time, the Finance Committee is struggling to find cuts we can tolerate. Everything we do is worth doing, so the cuts will be painful.

We've received a generous offer for the music ministry that will get us part way there. If you have a special fondness for a particular ministry or activity of the church, please consider making a gift over and above your regular and/or pledged giving to support that activity. If you do, please let someone on the Finance Committee know so we can adjust our plans. Prayers are also appreciated!

Meet Tim A. From Our Voices of Praise

his month I got the opportunity to chat with Tim A., one of Voices of Praise, and our Worship Leader Coordinator. It was a lot of fun.

Tim started coming to PB UMC about 15 years ago when he was invited to attend by Susan G., who was a client of his at Tiffany's. Shortly, he became a member. Soon after, our music ministry director Ron Jesse heard him singing in the congregation and asked him to join the choir. It was natural for him to accept Ron's invitation. His father was a Presbyterian minister and Tim sang in church choirs since he was a young boy.

Tim also very much enjoys his responsibilities as Worship Leader Coordinator. He told me, "I love that I get to coordinate this team of good people to share in the Sunday morning services. It is a wonderful way for each Worship Leader to participate in ministry alongside other church leaders."



Before I talked to Tim I was told that several years ago he gave art history lectures at PB UMC, especially as related to Christianity. When I asked about this, Tim told me, "I am an art historian and used to teach at San Diego State. My special interest is historical goldwork. That specialty led to a deep interest in the work of Carl Faberge, jeweler to the last two Tsars of Russia." Tim worked for 30 years in the fine jewelry industry for companies such as Jessops & Sons and Tiffany & Co. He has traveled around the world lecturing on jewelry history, especially Faberge, Tiffany, and Van Cleef & Arpels."

Tim was raised in San Diego. His 2 sisters, brother, and parents all also live in San Diego. He is a 5th generation Californian.

As I said, I really enjoyed getting to know Tim, and I hope you did, too. I know we all enjoy his participation in our Voices of Praise and serving as our Worship Leader.
