Winter Is Coming, and So Is Shelter Time at PB UMC

arsh winters are uncommon and perhaps an unlikely event here in San Diego. Nevertheless, there are families and individuals in need of shelter.

For over thirty years, members and friends of PB UMC have opened their hearts and shared their gifts, talents, and services in welcoming our Interfaith Shelter Network (IFSN) guests. All shelter guests must receive a referral from the approved Network social service agency working with each branch. We avoid labels, but use the terms neighbor, friend, or family member, for this is our way of providing hospitality for two weeks.

The Interfaith Shelter Network is comprised of seven branches. The 2017-2018 shelter season starts with the upcoming Interfaith Shelter training, September 23rd, at St. Catherine LaBoure Church. The September training provides an opportunity to network with representatives from all the branch congregations. There is a follow-up meeting of the Beach Branch (our branch) usually in October with more in-depth discussion, just prior to officially launching the IFSN program in the beach area. In the August *Beach Breeze* there was short mention of the two week period in January that PB UMC is scheduled to host Interfaith Shelter. The success of the Shelter program is dependent upon the many volunteers. Next month I will provide details of all the opportunities, as well as examples of how members went beyond, by lending their time, talents, and resources in making our guests welcome.

October Stewardship Focus

ach Sunday in worship, we experience a time of community prayer. Afterward, we prayerfully transition into our Offering, with a reminder that this time of passing plates and giving our financial gifts toward the ministry of the church is a continuation of prayer. We cannot understand the importance of giving without understanding it through prayer.

Rev. Melvin Amerson phrases it well in the book, *Celebrating the Offering*: "Celebrating the offering is a spiritual act of worship every believer can actively participate in each week. Giving becomes a celebration when the believer discovers the joy of generosity, which grows out of God's grace."

Over the course of this year, we have heard each month from our Finance Committee about some of the challenges we've faced this year. (Note: for this month's news, please see page 6.) Persons who give regularly also receive quarterly statements of their specific giving that generally includes a letter from the Pastor with ongoing news about the financial health of the church. Your committee chairs work hard throughout the year to honor approved budgets, and also to respond to shortages in estimated giving so that our church remains in a healthy financial position. All of this is done through faithful and prayerful discernment.

Of course, we remember that our financial giving is only one part of a larger expression of stewardship. As United Methodists, we covenant to support the ministries of the church with our prayers, our presence, our gifts, our service, and our witness. Please plan to join in our annual Stewardship conversation during the month of October, which will include the distribution and receipt of our annual Estimate of Giving cards. This time each year helps us to set individual goals of full expressions of stewardship toward the Ministries of this congregation, and helps our church leaders set goals and plan for the coming year.

Let us look toward this time with hope and with joy.

Pastor Bob's Printed Blog

Dear friends...

uring the summer months when many of the major television shows are on hiatus, the Rhodes family particularly enjoys watching American Ninja Warrior. The show is an athletic competition program featuring competitors who attempt various obstacles of ever-increasing difficulty and increasingly ambitious objectives. Of the dozens of competitors, only a few progress along the various stages through to the finals. As we have watched the show over the last few years, many reach their goals and many do not.

It seems to me that this can easily be seen as an allegory for life. We all work through challenges, and some periods of our lives seem as though those challenges are ever-increasing. We often set goals: to wake up on time, to get a job or a promotion, to start a new hobby. Some of us set these goals with vision and clarity, some of us simply decide that we want to do something better, and some have other approaches.

I confess that I have a difficult relationship with "goals." I absolutely think through shorter-term goals that, to me, seem a bit average. When I feel as though I do something poorly, I absolutely spend time and energy working toward improvement. But I don't think of that as setting and achieving goals. I'm sure this is a growth opportunity for me, and I've already begun working on it.

Our VUE (Visioning, Uniting, Expanding) committee works in a particular pattern of goal-setting that continues to be helpful. Though most have taken a summer break, we have set in motion several growing, small groups that meet during the week to discuss our weekly scriptures and sermons. We have already put in motion quarterly fellowship and learning opportunities. Most recently, our quarterly gathering featured the Rev. Julie Elkins and a onewoman show on women in the Bible. This month, we'll have a panel discussing LGBTQIA identity and relationships through scripture (see page 5). These are fantastic opportunities to gather together for fellowship and good food and great learning! This is a helpful model and I am learning how to incorporate goal-setting in my regular routines.

As you may know, sometimes goals are set for us by outside influencers. I wish to share with you a

goal that has been set for us – and a goal that has my full support. At the Annual Conference gathering in June, Bishop Grant Hagiya set a goal for all congregations in our region to meet the following objectives:

- Every local church needs to reach out to its surrounding neighborhood and bring 10 new people to Christ per year (10 new Baptisms, 10 new Professions of Faith, or some combination);
- every church to increase its average worship attendance by 10%;
- every church to make 25% of our current congregations into living Disciples;
- every church needs to give 100% of its apportionments.

The purpose of these goals is to revitalize all of the churches in our region with the understanding that revitalization is necessary for an estimated 90% of our congregations. I would suggest that revitalization should be an ongoing process even if we are growing.

These are lofty goals. These are far-reaching goals. And these are achievable goals. And even though these are goals for which I – your Pastor – will be held accountable, these are not goals I can achieve on my own. These are goals for all of us at Pacific Beach United Methodist Church.

So we have work to do, and it is good work. It is work that we will not do alone, but will do together and with the help of our gracious and loving God. What we do now continues to nourish those who are already in our midst, so let us look for new ways to be in ministry to and with our community so that we can achieve and even surpass these incredible goals. Let us join together in this good work!

Youth Mission Trip 2017

his summer we did something a bit different than Sierra Service Project (SSP) for our Mission Trip. We had some schedule conflicts and last minute changes that required me to pull our group from SSP. However, I did want those youth who were still planning to attend to have a project. By making the change and altering the date, we

had other youth join us. We took a road trip to Santa Clara, CA.

In the morning, we would go to Santa Clara UMC to help out with Vacation Bible School (VBS). Many of the children were young, and they were

from several different cultures. Some of the parents did not speak English very well. It was a great experience for us to help with all aspects of VBS.

In the afternoon, we worked on laying

a brick pathway and moving decomposed granite. We learned to lay brick and fill between with a

sand mixture. A couple of the youth got very good at splitting bricks to fit the edge pieces. Youth also got to operate a dump truck and use a construction zone plate compactor. We ended up moving about 16,000 pounds of decomposed granite.

Other aspects of the trip included preparing and cleaning up our own group meals. (For most, making individual pizzas was the best.) We also had evening devotion time. Since we finished our work project quickly, we were able to squeeze in a full day of fun, and went to Santa Cruz Beach Boardwalk.

The youth did such a great job representing PB UMC, we have been asked back to help any time! I am proud of the work they did, and of everyone's flexibility with the last minute changes.

Reflections From the Finance & Stewardship Team

July was a good month. Variations in giving and expenses for July are due to timing and are not of concern to the Finance Team. July expenses include two months custodial and utility bills.

July giving is a bit above budget. Other sources of income appear to be down, but are budgeted evenly throughout the year while we receive draws from our two biggest legacy funds only in March, June, August, and November. Adjusting for these timing issues, income and expenses are at budget for the month. We are still concerned about the year-to-date net loss. As we approach budgeting for 2018, we are mindful that we can't rely on certain particularly generous gifts to continue beyond 2017.

Some good news for any Intuit employees in the congregation: PB UMC has just been approved for their matching gifts program. Intuit matches up to \$5,000 per fiscal year for all donations made to eligible organizations.

September Communion Offering: Christian Education

ur offering in September will be in support of Christian education Sunday, which is a Special Sunday for ministries within our annual conference.

Christian Education Sunday calls the church as the people of God to be open to growth and learning as disciples of Jesus Christ. Christian education is not just for children! The hope is that you will continue God-inspired learning for the rest of your life.


