Interfaith Shelter Network and PB UMC 2017

This is the 32nd season of hosting Interfaith Shelter Network (ISN) guests here at Pacific Beach UMC. The shelter program is where more than 200 homeless men, women and children receive shelter and other services for a two week period. Over the years, the demographic composition of shelter guests has changed; we are seeing more single parents with children and extended families. Our guests will arrive Saturday, January 13th, to officially launch the start of the two week period at PB UMC. Each guest in the ISN is pre-screened and receives additional case management support in their endeavors to get their lives on more solid footing. The guests will be at the church from 5:00 pm in the evening to 7:00 am the next morning during their two-week stay. They will sleep, shower, and eat their breakfasts and dinners at the church. As each guest leaves during the day – for work, job hunting, going to school, or Sunday worship services – we will send them off with a healthy sack lunch.

PB UMC ministries, in collaboration with the Interfaith Shelter Network and other organizations, have helped provide some immediate survival demands for adequate food and health service needs for over 30 years. Continuing this service tradition is achieved with the contributions of members and friends who generously donate their talents, gifts, and services.

Volunteer recruitment will begin the month of November, with sign-up sheets located in the church narthex after each worship service. There is a variety of volunteer opportunities, but the most critical needs are overnight supervisors; dinner hosts; lunch hosts; January 13th set-up, including picking up guests' luggage and cots; then clean-up, on January 27th, involving shelter break-down and washing bed linens.

During December, donation boxes will be placed in the narthex to collect personal care items such as deodorant, travel size hand and body lotion, gloves, socks, soap, toothpaste and brushes, feminine hygiene items, razors, and shampoo and conditioners.

Along with my fellow coordinators, Betty J. and Steve F., we thank you for your support and service. Together we are looking forward to hosting and displaying our genuine PB UMC hospitality in welcoming guests.

Hepatitis-A infections create an additional concern, especially among the populations most at-risk, and among the service providers for these populations. During our final ISN Orientation we were told that to date, no one in the homeless population has refused getting vaccinated. Our case manager will also encourage each shelter guest to get vaccinated. Vaccination is the best safe guard; however, the simple act of washing hands with soap and hot water before eating, preparing, or serving food is equally important.

Pastor Bob's Printed Blog

Dear friends...

When I read studies and articles related to the decline of membership in mainline Protestant denominations, they often lead to explorations of generational differences and ultimately to this question: Where are the Millennials?

Research from Pew Research Center <http://tinyurl.com/hpc3aoq> and <http://tinyurl.com/j84sh8h> shows that Millennials are more and more affiliating as “nones” (persons with no religious affiliation). Additional reading and one-on-one conversations lead to one possible cause: authenticity.

Imagine our Millennial family and friends (those born between 1981 and 1996), raised by thoughtful parents who have passed on hard-earned lessons about critical thinking and making choices for themselves. Is it any wonder that this generation – when faced with religious leaders and others who publicly say one thing while privately doing another – looks with skepticism at organized religion? Our news channels and news feeds abound with people who claim faith and then act in opposition to that same claim.

How can we be believable? How can we show ourselves as authentic human beings and as authentic persons of faith? These are questions that faith leaders continue to wrestle with as we wonder what the future of the Church will be.

One way that I try to be authentic is to be honest about questions and doubts and vulnerabilities because I have all of those. I have them all the time, and I think it's important to be open and transparent when we struggle, when we don't have all the answers, when we're searching.

Because when we are willing to humble ourselves on this journey, I think we find that we don't have to endure the journey alone.

I surely have no business calling myself a Millennial, but I

do share the desire for authenticity. As soon as someone says they have all the answers, as soon as someone says they have the end-all-be-all capital-T Truth, I find myself skeptical and questioning and wondering about motives. I find myself probing for faults and inconsistencies. I doubt.

Perhaps it is this observation about myself that causes me to engage in conversations differently, because I don't think I have the end-all-be-all capital-T Truth. I think that kind of Truth is too big for me to understand, and so I have to describe it in bits and pieces, in fits and starts.

In the words of Kevin Smith's film *Dogma* (my favorite theological film, but don't watch it if you're offended by language), it is an *idea*. I experience this *idea* in my own understandings and perceptions about the world, and I share this *idea* with humility because I think it's an *idea* that's bigger and better than I can possibly explain it. And so I share it with the understanding that I could be getting it wrong, but with the authenticity that I'm learning alongside the rest of humanity.

What would our religious landscape look like if we were open to the *idea* of learning from one another? What would our religious conversations look like if we stopped claiming to have all the answers and instead acknowledged that we have as many questions as the person sitting in the pew (or car or table) next to us?

Let us journey together. Let us understand that in our vulnerabilities and in our questions, we can be authentically trustworthy. Let us be open and transparent in our struggling and in our searching. In this Christ-like humility, I believe we can embody and share the most incredible *idea*.

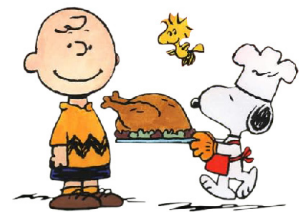

MEET OUR SOJOURNING PASTOR: DR. CHRISTOPHER CARTER

This month I got the opportunity to chat with Pastor Christopher Carter, PhD, our assistant pastor and an assistant professor of theology at University of San Diego (USD).

He told me he chose PB UMC as his conference church because of Pastor Bob. I asked him how he knew Pastor Bob. "Bob and I went to seminary together. I got to pick a church to conference with because I am a provisional elder. It is volunteer work. I don't get paid, but it is something I want to do."

What made him decide to become a pastor? "I had some of the same doubts Bob did when I realized I wanted to be a pastor. I was a youth group leader getting my bachelor's degree. Even as a young child I had a love for church and a love for learning about theology. But, I was scared when I felt the call to be a pastor. I was afraid of how it might affect my marriage. When I told my wife, she asked me if I was sure, suggesting I think about getting some counsel from other clergy. I told her, 'No, God really has called me.' Her encouragement while I was in graduate school helped me to excel in ways I'd never excelled in before."

When I asked him how he was handling the two assignments, he answered, "When teaching, I want my students each to leave the classroom as a better person. When preaching, I want you to leave the church as a more informed and virtuous person. Those positions are not really different; they just have a different audience."

I was disappointed that his wife, Gabrielle, couldn't join us. He told me, "She is a veterinarian in her internship year, and she works about 60 hours a week." When we finished our conversation, we decided to have a similar one in a year. At that time, Gabrielle will join us. So, look forward to "Meet Our Drs. Christopher and Gabrielle" next year.
