PB UMC's visioning event on September 21st generated some great information.

Now we take the next step. Our fabulous consultant Dr. Cedrick Bridgforth has used the input to shape a congregational assessment. Please take some time to participate in our assessment before November 10th. Our goal is to hear from every member of PB UMC and include everyone's opinions and perspectives in our plan and in our planning process. Here is the link: https://bit.ly/PBUMCAssessment.

In case it's not convenient for you to complete the online survey on your own, we will be holding an assessment party after each service on Sunday, November 3. If you do not have a laptop, tablet, or smart phone, we will have some available for you to use. If you have one of these devices, please bring it so you can provide input during the party or assist others to do so. The assessment form takes about 15-20 minutes to fill out. Light refreshments will be provided. Assistance can also be provided by phone.

After we receive all of the assessment data we will begin making some suggestions based on the data you provide. We will also ask the congregation to provide feedback on what we propose so that our entire congregation is fully engaged throughout this process. Pastor Bob's Printed Blog

Dear Friends . . .

s we enter the month of November, we are nearing the end of our liturgical year. We are also at an annual turning point because our annual Church Conference will be in just a few days. We are experiencing much transition in this time.

One potential transition—admittedly one in which we are still in limbo—is the transition of our denomination. What will become of The United Methodist Church? Will our denomination repent of the harm done through the hateful language and punitive practices set forth in our revised Book of Discipline? Will those called to inclusive ministry resist from within, or form a new denomination?

Bishop Grant Hagiya has asked congregations in our Annual Conference to envision what a "new church" might look like, and part of our ongoing visioning process is intended to address this request. As part of this process, many PB UMC leaders and members gathered on a Saturday morning with Rev. Dr. Cedrick Bridgeforth to begin this dialogue, and out of this an online survey was formed for PB UMC members. *All* participants in our congregation are invited to participate using this link: https://bit.ly/PBUMCAssessment.

We continue to be in transition in our styles of Worship. Over the summer, we began a new worship format using primarily modern Christian music led by guitars and percussion and including intentional conversation time. This has been met with passionate response, with some strongly opposing the new format and others strongly in favor. Your Growing In Faith committee has wrestled faithfully with this feedback, and made adjustments including the return of The Voices of Praise to this newly-styled service.

Most recently, the Growing In Faith committee has elected to identify these services by name. The 9:00 am service that has been largely unchanged over the last several years is now called "Mid-Century Modern" because of its classic and timely worship design that harkens to the 1950s and 1960s, the timeframe that this worship style embodies. The newly formatted 10:30 am service is called "Connexion" because of its intentional times of conversation, using John Wesley's old-English spelling as he wrote about the importance of our "connexion" with God and with one another.

In the midst of all of this, I believe another transition is

taking place. During much of this year, these pages from "Pastor Bob's Printed Blog" have had an intentional focus on the reminder that this church belongs to the people who give themselves to this community. This church is led most faithfully and most effectively by the laity who respond to God's call to servant leadership. It is both inaccurate and—in my opinion—spiritually dangerous to think of a church or congregation as belonging to the pastor. Yes, the pastor provides leadership and vision, and must do so as a servant leader. It is the representative lay leadership of this congregation that has the solemn task each year to communicate with the Annual Conference the congregation's desire to keep their current pastor(s) or to request another. Why? Because the church belongs to the people.

In the month of October, lay members of this congregation have taken leadership in our worship gatherings to speak about the ways this congregation has touched members of this faith community and the community of Pacific Beach. As part of this conversation, our speakers have been realistic about the challenges we face as a congregation. Even facing difficult circumstances, we are reminded that this congregation is in the capable hands of our faithful lay leadership.

Finally, I wish to remind you that I, too, am in the midst of transition. In this difficult time of personal transition, our Staff-Parish Relations Committee (SPRC) and our District Superintendent have recommended that I take a period of personal leave. I will do so for the last three weeks of November, returning in time for our Advent season.

In this time of transition and questions, we may feel as though we are in the midst of chaos. Yet, it is in the midst of chaos that God's voice speaks, that God's voice brings order and calls forth light. As the Spirit moves among us and within us, may we hear God's call and leap with joy into God's light.

All Church Conference

ur congregation meets annually to make budgetary decisions, elect leaders, receive reports from various areas of the church, and more. This year's Church Conference is an especially important one as we will be considering a major change in the structure of several church committees.

We will receive a special report and recommendation from the subcommittee on Simple Board Governance. This group has been meeting to study and discern whether this governance style would be beneficial for our congregation to implement. The subcommittee made a recommendation to the Administrative Council, who voted unanimously to send this on to the November Church Conference. The proposal involves combining the three "business" committees of the church (Trustees, Finance, and Staff-Parish Relations) with the Administrative Council. Flattening and combining our committee structure in this way will mean fewer people will be needed to sit on various committees, and that decisions can be made more efficiently (less back and forth between committees). Our Church Conference will be held on Tuesday, November 5th at 6:00 pm. All professing members of PB UMC are eligible to vote. Please come to celebrate the good work of 2019 and make your voice heard as we plan for 2020 and beyond!

Reflections From the Finance & Stewardship Team

e continue to hold expenses well below budget. The bookkeeper is almost finished catching up issues due to our switch to a newer version of Quickbooks. As a result, the numbers in our Record of Generosity table are still preliminary. This month's report includes accounting updates to previous months, so the last month's estimated Record of Generosity does not tie to the current table. September income includes two months' rental income, but our year to date income minus expenses is virtually unchanged from October's *Beach Breeze* report. Please continue to pray for the financial health of the church.

In October we received an additional \$32,000 from the Steve Frank estate, which will be used for Labor of Love if needed and otherwise to seed a property maintenance capital campaign fund. You won't see this donation in the Record of Generosity table, because it's not part of our annual operating income and expenses.

November Communion Offering: Interfaith Shelter

he Interfaith Shelter Network (ISN) involves congregations of all denominations county-wide in a rotational shelter program. Many congregations host the program in their facilities, and the remainder serve in a valuable support role by providing volunteers for meals and overnight hosting, transportation, and donations. People are sheltered where there are no shelters, and receive the understanding and support of congregations. Congregations benefit by getting to know homeless individuals personally, and the mutual sharing of stories is beneficial to both.

Guests are screened by an area social service agency to assure there will be no active drug, alcohol, or mental health problems. Guests sent to the ISN's congregations must be willing to work closely with the referring social service agency to resolve the problems leading to their homelessness.

We will welcome our Interfaith Shelter guests to PB UMC March 24-April 4, 2020.





Meet the Writer's Writer: Marcia Mengel

f ever there were such a position as a "Stealth Social Ambassador," it would go to Marcia. Each month, in PB UMC's *Beach Breeze*, she writes the "mini-bio" on various members of the church. Through her thoughtfully detailed "Barbara Walters" type interviews she is able to introduce to you different members.

For some reason I was under the misconception that Marcia's favorite color is red. Her car is red. Her hair is red. And I recall seeing her wear something red around the Christmas holidays. So when I called to set up an interview, I suggested she wear something red. Her response, "Now David, why would I wear red? It's Breast Cancer Awareness Month (BCAM). Pink will be my color." And Pink it was. Not only to show support of BCAM, but in celebration of 14 years Cancer Free!

Marcia's nature can easily be described as unassuming, which is not very surprising for someone who carried one of the nation's highest security clearances for many years. Upon graduation from college, she applied for and was accepted by the Department of Defense (DOD). Much, if not all, of the work she performed was of a highly classified nature. A good number of the projects assigned to her helped to protect our country. This, she found, was most rewarding.

Something I found interesting was that her father was a US Navy pilot in WW II. On his return from a mission he had engine trouble, and crash landed. Observing the crash from the tower, a female communication specialist standing next to the Air Traffic Controller was quick to call an ambulance. Fortunately, due to the quick actions of the specialist, the pilot survived and was sent to the nearby hospital to recover. A few days later the communication specialist visited the pilot; and here lies a story book ending. The two fell in love and got married. Marcia was their first child.

Marcia often times is a Greeter. She also is the secretary on the Finance Committee. In addition, she keeps track of members who are absent from church for several weeks, and sends out an e-mail to make sure they are okay.
