# Volunteers Needed for Interfaith Shelter Program at PB UMC

Pacific Beach United Methodist Church, as part of its ministry to the homeless community, has served as a host congregation for the Interfaith Shelter Network (IFSN) for over 30 years. This ministry is successful because of the many volunteers and supporters who donate their time, talents, and service. In continuing this tradition of service to the community, PB UMC will be hosting the shelter program March 21 to April 4, 2020. We need volunteers. Our community of faith may be smaller than past years, but our spirit of service has never diminished, because we are children of God called to serve. There are a variety of areas where help is needed.

Early on Saturday morning March 21<sup>st</sup>, there are set up opportunities. We transport shelter guests' belongings from the previous host church to ours, set up cots, and get beds ready. Prior to the arrival of our shelter guests, we need volunteers to contribute breakfast food items and other items on our needs list. During their two-week stay here at the church, our guests eat breakfasts, have prepared lunch sacks, and return in the evening to enjoy a nice prepared dinner. Therefore, we need individuals or groups to serve as lunch and dinner hosts. Lunch sacks are prepared the evening before assigned date and are dropped off at the church around 6:00 pm. Dinner hosts prepare meals and serve the guests around 6:15 pm. The church's kitchen is available for use for all meal preparations.

IFSN coordinators are willing to work around your schedules, so if you need to drop off lunches earlier, no problem. If you want to arrive at the church early to prepare your gourmet meal, no worries. After our guests finish their meal, they help clean the kitchen and then settle in for the evening. Each evening, an overnight supervisor is there: another area where you can participate as a volunteer. Overnight supervisors get to eat dinner with our shelter guests.

On April 4<sup>th</sup>, the shelter program comes to an end for the season, so we need volunteers to help with the breakdown of the cots, collecting used linens for laundry, and packing up our shelter supplies.

The last, final area where volunteer help is needed consists of washing the used bed linens and blankets and returning them to the church clean and folded for storage.

So where do you begin? By looking for the many open volunteer opportunities on the sign-up sheets located in the church lobby during worship services. If you have any questions, just ask any of the coordinators (Betty, Ray, or Ken). We are grateful for your continued support and service to this vital ministry to the community.

## Pastor Bob's Printed Blog

Dear Friends . . .

arly this year, United Methodists were rocked with the news that a group of 16 leaders from around I the denomination had been meeting for months, and were releasing a "protocol" outlining a split in The United Methodist Church (UMC). The leaders who participated, including Central Conference Bishops, Wesley Covenant Association, Institute on Religion and Democracy, UMNext, Mainstream UMC, Reconciling Ministries Network, and the United Methodist Queer Clergy Caucus, represented a variety of perspectives in the denomination related to human sexuality.

Moderating the group was Ken Feinberg, a nationally known mediator who has a national reputation for bringing disparate groups to resolution. Mr. Feinberg's experience includes having served as special master of the September 11<sup>th</sup> Victim Compensation Fund, TARP Executive Compensation, and the Agent Orange Victim Compensation Program.

According to the document (http://bit.ly/2Rf8xRz) released on January 3<sup>rd</sup>—and its accompanying FAQ the "Protocol of Reconciliation & Grace Through Separation" calls for a departure of traditionalist churches from the UMC to form a new denomination that would be expected to retain its ban on LGBTQ clergy and samegender marriages. To follow would be a restructuring of the post-separation UMC into regions, allowing U.S. churches the freedom to remove the harmful and exclusive language in the Book of Discipline. This would allow Bishops and Annual Conferences to ordain LGBTQ clergy and would allow churches and pastors to host and perform same-gender wedding ceremonies.

The Protocol sets aside \$25 million for the new traditionalist denomination over four years, and churches leaving for the new denomination would be able to retain their properties and other assets. An additional \$2 million would be set aside for progressive congregations that would still want to leave the post-separation UMC.

Annual Conferences (regional bodies of the current denomination) would have the opportunity to decide if they want to leave the UMC, and local churches could also hold votes to depart should they disagree with the theological stance of their Annual Conference. For example, an Annual Conference in a theologically conservative region could elect to leave the UMC, but an inclusive congregation within that region could elect to stay. However, no local church or Annual Conference would be required to hold a vote. If a regional body declines to vote, it would remain in the UMC; if a local church declines to

vote, it would remain in the denomination with which its Annual Conference affiliates.

This news is both significant and surprising. A livestreamed Q&A with the mediation participants (http://bit.ly/36dPQC2) shows both the difficulty of the mediated dialogue as well as the sense of hope shared by the participants. I was interviewed by the San Diego Union-Tribune for an article (http://bit.ly/3a5lYe2) published on Sunday, January 12th, and this was just one of countless articles around the country, including national news outlets like the New York Times and others.

It is important to note that this protocol is not authoritative. There is still much work to be done. The protocol outlines a process that must be refined into legislation that will be presented at the General Conference in May of this year, and will only be enacted if passed by that legislative body. In the meantime, much conversation is underway and many questions are still to be answered. I found a helpful analysis (http://bit.ly/2MTKzc7) written by my friend and colleague, Rev. Jeremy Smith.

As I understand this protocol, I find it to be an imperfect compromise. I am unhappy that \$25 million will be used as seed money for a new denomination that—in my view—will continue to do harm to our LGBTQ siblings. On the other hand, I'm grateful that this could be the end of a battle that has been going on my entire life. Leaders across the theological spectrum seem to share the view that this compromise is imperfect, yet most also seem to share a sense of hope that the protocol can pass at General Conference.

As we await these historic decisions, we will continue to worship, we will continue to study and grow in our faith, we will continue to serve our vulnerable neighbors, we will continue to proclaim that God's love is for all God's children, and we will continue to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world.

## **New Church Governance**

uring our annual Church Conference this past November, members of PB UMC approved a structural change to our leadership committees with the intent of simplifying the leadership structure of the church. This will reduce the number of volunteer leaders required, and enable those leaders to be more efficient and effective.

The new Church Council consists of ten voting members: three with an emphasis on what has traditionally been Trustees' work, three with an emphasis on Finance, three with an emphasis on Staff Parish Relations (SPRC), and the Lay Leader. If the Treasurer and/or Bookkeeper are not elected as Council members, they are considered non-voting, ex-officio members. The Financial Secretary may also attend meetings or provide information as needed.

The Church Council will have the authority to set its own schedule, and the first meeting is set for Tuesday, February 11<sup>th</sup> at 6:30 pm. While we expect meetings to last 1.5-2 hours, this is a new committee that will find its rhythm as they begin working together. Like previous Boards of Trustees, the Church Council will elect its own Chairperson. Members for this inaugural Church Council were selected from the previous Board of Trustees, Finance Committee, and SPRC.


# **Sunday School News**

#### **Reflections From the Finance Team**

our finance team has been hard at work cleaning up the accounting records in the aftermath of fraud. As a result, the Record of Generosity is still in draft form, but we are getting closer to a final number for our year-to-date income minus expenses. December activity looks high in part because a lot of income and expenses were posted in December to catch up with previous months. Insurance will cover most of our fraud losses, as well as lost rental income and repair expenses due to the fire at our rental house on Reed Avenue.

The church has endowments, and we are not running out of money, but we are very concerned about the continuing trend of net losses for most recent years. The numbers reflect decreasing giving income, in spite of instances of great generosity. And we have kept our expenses under budget. Please keep us in your prayers as Church Council prepares to set a budget for 2020.



## Meet Mavi B.

recently learned a lot about Mavi B. She told me, "I started attending PB UMC about 2 years ago but my journey with this church goes back to high school when I participated in Ron Jessee's show choir at Monte Vista High School. We had performances at PB UMC. In 2010 I came back for Easter and other holidays. Again, it was Ron's music that attracted me. Recently, my little brother died, and Ron, offering a place of healing and spiritual reconnection, suggested I come back. It was God, through Ron, that brought me back and showed me the magic that happens at PB UMC."

Recently Mavi provided us two sermons when Pastor Bob was on travel. She told me, "Both times it was a positive experience for me. I believe God brings us what we need, and at that time I needed to let go of the pain and harmful doctrine I had experienced when I was younger. Being able to connect with the church in this capacity helped me to do that. I've found so much support which I am so grateful for." We are grateful to her for the messages she has provided, and are especially happy to know these experiences helped her grow.

When I asked about her experience in our choir, she told me, "The music program at PB UMC has been a Godsend for me. I needed to grieve some massive losses. It was through the choir that I was able to regain my connection to my feelings, cry, laugh, and feel again. I thank God every day for the opportunity to serve in the choir."

I asked what other things she has been doing at PB UMC. "It came into my heart that I wanted to be added into the rotation to be a worship leader. I've enjoyed that so much. I also love helping with communion. I get to connect with God and the community in a super sacred way. It's one ritual that has always been incredibly meaningful to me."

She told me about why she recently left us, "In August, I unexpectedly lost my job. As the family's primary supporter, I was faced with the reality that in San Diego many people are just one unexpected life-changing event from being homeless. Thankfully, I was hired just 3 days later by a company in Las Vegas. I am a marketing strategist and digital communications director."
